You've gone again 14 way out and beyond what you have to do. And we 15 sure appreciate it, and I know all the horsemen 16

here appreciate it too because we get business done and get things ready to go for the next season here.

First on the agenda is approval of memorandum from December 10, 2020 meeting. If somebody wants to make a motion and a second.

As I 16 understand, it's part of the phase that we're 17 trying to update the rules to the RC standards, and 18 this is just the next phase of it. 19 With that, Noah, do you want to kind of 20 capsulize them for us? 21 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Agenda MR. JACKSON: 22 item one is the proposed emergency rules, which 23 cover harness racing, flat racing, and an all 24 breeds category, which in this case is largely 25 wagering rules. The rule packet in your meeting

booklets was provided to stakeholders with request for any comments or suggestions. And there were a few comments, stakeholder comments that have been discussed and addressed by staff.

Only one language change was made after the rules were sent to the stakeholders. And that change is to 71 IAC 9-4-15. The new rule language will now allow for the superfecta wager to carry over to the next race day.

Stakeholders were also notified that if they wish to speak to the rules at the meeting, that they should be physically present or appear online after having pre-registered. I believe there may be one or more individuals wishing to make a statement this morning on the rules.

Although these rules are presented on the agenda separately, the Commission typically casts a single vote in favor or opposition of the passage of the rules. And the rules are submitted as a single document to the Legislative Services Agency.

So before we moved further, if we wanted to have the comments on the rules.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Do we have anybody here who would like to comment? There's a lot of rules here.

JEFF JOHNSTON: I'd like to comment online, Mr. Chairman.

JEFF JOHNSTON: This is Jeff Johnston with the Jockey's Guild. Just a comment on 71 IAC 7.5-3-4, scale of weights. I understand what the Commission is doing here. And I talked with Eric Smith and Deena about it. But just to go on the record, the Jockey's Guild and the jockey colony at Indiana Grand support the ARCI model rule as written which eliminates the, or would not include a allowance for Indiana breds running against open company. What this rule essentially does is it reduces the minimum weight 3 pounds farther than the current model rule is. So the jockeys would be on a daily basis expected to weigh 115 pounds with all their tack, which means they would have to weigh 111.

Most of our jockeys anymore cannot do this weight. So it's a health and safety issue for us. I understand why the rule's written as it is. And I talked to Chris Polzin, the racing secretary, who will monitor how many overweights we have this year and possibly have a request for a future amendment

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     to this rule again. But, again, I just wanted to
    go on the record to say that we support the model

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Next on the agenda is the review of the Commission rulings. There's only like five so I don't know if anybody has any questions, but if you do, now's the time, Commissioners.

Seeing none, next is the approval of the RMTC certified split sample laboratories for 2021 and beyond pursuant to 71 IAC so forth. Deena, do you want to discuss the lab?

DEENA PITMAN: Yes, thank you. We go through this every year. We have a number of laboratories that are accredited through the RMTC. And we have a list available to trainers if they, by chance, have a positive test throughout the year. And they can select the lab that is listed to handle a split sample if they have a split available.

We also have on this list, in addition to an RMTC list, a secondary laboratory that is not on the RMTC list, University of Kentucky Veterinary Diagnostic Lab. And they are utilized as our primary cobalt lab. Cobalt is a little bit different. It's a natural substance that is tested for. And there are thresholds for that. And if

you're over the threshold, then you have to have a 1 split sample sent. You don't have to, but you have 2. a choice to send a split sample. So we have the 3 cobalt laboratory through Kentucky. They are not 4 5 an RMTC lab so, therefore, we have to waive the rule that we have on the books because there is no 6 such RMTC-accredited cobalt laboratory. 7 Then we also have a split laboratory that 8 we've identified that can do cobalt testing in 9 10 addition to Kentucky. And that would be the 11 University California-Davis. And it just so 12 happens that they're already certified with RMTC as 13 well, but their cobalt lab is not so that's where 14 the waiver from the rule comes in. So is that 15 clear as mud? 16 CHAIRMAN BORST: No, makes sense. Cobalt is 17 newer. Any Commission questions, Commissioners? 18 Okay. Accept a motion and a second. 19 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Moved. 20 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: I move for.

          With casino revenues being down just a tick,
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we're dealing with a little bit less money than we typically would on a given year. And our budget reflects that. So we budgeted very conservatively for the program, but we still feel that this program has a lot to offer for the Thoroughbred horsemen participating. I will be happy to answer any questions you have.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions on the Thoroughbred breed development program? Why don't we go to the Quarter Horse. I think we'll just vote for all three of them at once.

JESSICA BARNES: That's fine. The Quarter
Horse breed development program in the same way,
we're operating with a little bit less money, but
one of the things we did with Quarter Horse last
year is we did not go back after revenue started
coming in much higher than we expected when we
opened, we didn't make an adjustment. So we have
quite a bit of reserves there. So we were able to
keep the program actually where it was last year,
and actually implement a couple of improvements to
it.

So one of the things we did was one of the rule changes you guys just approved in item two was to bring the award for open races up to where they

were for bred races. So we were able to actually bring that percentage up for the program. So we've offered a really great program for Quarter Horses.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay.

JESSICA BARNES: And then also in the Standardbred program, they were in the same situation where we didn't adjust. We budgeted very conservatively when COVID hit. We didn't go back and make any adjustments when revenues came in a little bit higher for a few months. So that put us in a pretty good position going into this year's program so we were actually able to offer the same program that we had originally intended to for the beginning of 2020 for the 2021 meet.

CHAIRMAN BORST: I know it's a puzzle trying to put all these together.

JESSICA BARNES: A little bit.

CHAIRMAN BORST: That's for sure with all the moving pieces. We appreciate all your work. I know it's hard to put it together.

JESSICA BARNES: We budgeted fairly conservative for all three of these programs so if things do drastically change and start to get much, much better, we will probably be coming back to the Commission at some time during the season just so

We think one way to alleviate that is to move that live racing day to the end of the meet in November. We talked about some different spots

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     during the summer and whatnot. November was so
     good for us last year. If you recall, we had some

     $3 million days in November and thought maybe we'll
     try that for this year.

Do you want to start off? 14 15 DEENA PITMAN: I just want to make sure that 16 you remember a while back with the earlier purchase 17 of Centaur by Caesars, there was a schedule that 18 was approved out through -- what is it, Noah? 19 It's 2033. MR. JACKSON: 20 2033. Okay. Certain items DEENA PITMAN: 21 that would come up for replacement. And these 22 particular items sometimes -- I mean, it was very 23 hard to determine what would be necessary in any 24 given year. So there have been a few years here 25 lately that items were due to be replaced, but it

wasn't necessary. So the racetracks have each gone through on occasion and decided that there was something else that that money could be spent on that was still a benefit to racing. And this is what we have here.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Eric.

ERIC HALSTROM: Thanks, Deena. So in our approved capital plan for 2021 is we had \$137,000 to be spent. Eleven thousand of that was a welder for our track superintendent Roy Smith. And, frankly, he says the one he's got right now is like new so he didn't feel like that was a great spend.

The other 126,000 was on three Ford F150 pickup trucks for our maintenance staff. And the fact of the matter is we have so many vehicles back there, and all of them have several years left of life. That seemed to be a waste to trade in a vehicle just to get a new one because it was in that thing. We've got some great ideas here that we'd like to talk about for substitute capital.

There's two themes of this. One is we want to improve our on-track, on-site experience for our simulcasting customers, not just here but also at our Clarksville OTB, which is if you see the business that comes out of there, many days our

Clarksville OTB is doing half the handle in the state. So it's down the river by Louisville and whatnot and got a real strong crew and a very wise group of wagering customers and whatnot. And we need to improve the services that we have for them down there. It's outdated. It hasn't been improved since it was put in a couple of decades ago, I believe.

2.2

So what you see in front of you is some improvements down in the Winner's Circle in the casino. We want to add three, 98-inch televisions, which will greatly enhance what our customers are seeing down there right now. This is in the racing side of the OTB down there. Sports Book is over there. This is where the customers sit in carols and their wagering platforms there. Ninety-eight inch high definition is the best qualities you can possibly get. I think that would be a great improvement for our folks down there.

I want to come back to Clarksville. The biggest issue they've got down there is the equipment is so old that we're having a hard time doing some very practical things in helping our customers be able to watch races. Walls of TVs that are unable to be changed without changing

every TV. We've got lots of issues. This 20 years ago, the technology wasn't there for this stuff. This would allow us to take from the back end, signal is coming in, send them directly to the TVs, have people be able to ask for different stuff. There are times where we're not able to accommodate all our customers' simulcasting needs right there because it's so difficult in that confined space in that OTB, especially with the good business down there that they're certainly doing.

Then the last piece, and this is probably the one I'm most excited about to talk about in this whole request for substitution is Indiana Grand would like to be the first track that I'm aware of -- there's been some national broadcasting to try to mix this in. But we want to use and perfect a drone for our TV production. We think that by being the first one in this, and it will take a little practice. We won't put it into use until we're absolutely ready. But we think there's an opportunity out there to always strive to try to make yourself look better than your competition. We've got some great ideas as far as how this drone could enhance handicapping angles for our customers, the views for our stewards, different

things where there might be some spots on the racetrack that our fixed cameras don't get quite as well based on the angle.

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We've spoken with our state vet. We've talked. He's got a lot of experience on working with drones at the Breeder's Cup and different things. We're excited. We think that after we get this down pat, work with the horsemen to make sure it's exactly what it's all spec'd out to be. We're buying a high end drone that's low volume, and a camera that's very top end.

So this would be something I think that at the end of the year we can say we are pretty proud of to be the first one to try to take a stab at adding, enhancing our customer experience and doing something that nobody else gets to do that you don't see anywhere else. So we respectfully request to substitute the capital for this and answer any questions you might have.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Makes sense not to just buy something to buy it. I'm excited about the drone too.

DEENA PITMAN: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN BORST: This isn't your \$49.99 drone. That's for sure. You may not know. How long will

it be able to go on a charge? They typically don't go too long. But this one at this price should go for a while.

ERIC HALSTROM: I can talk for about a half hour on this one. I've got all the answers. It's great. Each battery can go about a half hour. So what we're planning on purchasing is a rack of, like, 12 of them. And they're constantly being recharged. So we'll have to have a landing spot between races. This is all going to be part of the experience of learning how you do this. But over the course of a day with this battery pack, we can send that thing up and down, just keep changing batteries and whatnot. It will really be something.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: Who's training your guys to run that drone? That's a little tricky.

ERIC HALSTROM: Yes, it is. We have three of our employees going through training right now.

We've got one who we kind of thought would be our main, our main drone flyer. I'm not sure what the term is for that, but all three will go through training. Then at that point they have to pass an FAA test. It's essentially something that the FAA has to approve them as being worthy to do this.

That's one of the reasons why we waited for this time, not just the timing of the meeting, we wanted to be the first to do this. And it seems like you let these secrets out, somebody else is going to try to do what you're doing. But I can tell you the time it takes to get this going between the training and buying high end equipment, we're going to spend almost \$30,000 on this. It's very in depth. We'll be looking to purchase this essentially this afternoon. We have the vendor lined up, get it in, start working in the mornings around training time, just different angles and seeing how horses run around and all that.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: Great idea.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Yeah, I think the stewards would like it too because they can take a look at the film. I don't know if you're going to make it available to the horsemen or not, but there might be a market for that to watch to see just where a horse does better and where it starts to falter or whatever.

ERIC HALSTROM: It's an interesting point. I think it's one of the things -- we're not looking to take away what you normally see for a horseplayer but to add a replay of the gallop out

or something in the paddock. Right now our paddock shot is not great. It's very low. There's some things we can improve upon, and we'll find out what works best when we start trying it.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: Great idea.

CHAIRMAN BORST: The drone and the 98-inch TV has got my attention. I'd like to have both, but that's the way it goes.

Any other Commission Member questions?

Commissioner McCarty or Pillow?

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: You won't be in the flight arrivals or departure plans for nearby airports, will you?

ERIC HALSTROM: No, sir. The thing stays about the level of the light poles, if you can imagine what that is. Yeah, part of the -- to your question though it's really true is, we also got the highest end camera so it will make it where you can put that thing wherever we need to to make sure it's not affecting anybody, any horses, any humans, anything like that because the camera will be the piece that really gets what we're looking for.

CHAIRMAN BORST: I guess you probably do have to clear that with the Shelbyville airport.

And because the Commission may 4 5 not meet during those times or often enough to handle the immediate matters, Commission staff 6 routinely requests that the Commission delegate 7 authority to Executive Director Pitman to handle 8 9 matters that arise between the Commission meetings. 71 IAC 2-2-1, the Commission may delegate authority 10 11 to the Executive Director to implement and execute 12 the duty of regulating each race meeting and 13 persons participating in each meeting.

The Commission staff would respectfully request delegation of authority to Director Pitman to make race meet decisions as required that cannot be left for a Commission meeting.

JOE MORRIS: Good morning, Commissioners, Joe 18 19 Morris with Caesars Entertainment Racing. 20 you've heard here today, we're not going to go with 21 just status quo. We're doing things for our 2.2 gamblers. We're doing things for our OTBs. 23 bringing in new technology to help enhance our gold standard Indiana racing program here. 24

Winter training, we winterized our barns.

25

1 had 150,000 approved for that project. We brought that project in for about 70,000. That was the 2 3 good news there. We were supposed to have a EuroXciser going hand in hand with that with the 4 winterized barns. We've run into some Corona 5 issues, some permit issues, a little harder than we 6 7 thought to get through some of the processes with that. We are pouring cement on that this week, but 8 we did not have that available over the winter. 9 10 What we did is we made sure we kept our racing oval 11 operational and ready. I call him the winter 12 wizard, Roy Smith, he was out there. He kept that 13 surface good and worked hand in hand with the horsemen here. And we were able to provide 14 15 five-days-a-week training pretty much all winter 16 long. That went through all right. And with the 17 EuroXciser built, that will be up for our meet this 18 summer. And we'll have it for next year. 19 What you've heard on the new technology and on 20

What you've heard on the new technology and on our doing things for gamblers, we also need to do things for our product. So we had come to you with a new barn and grooms' quarters. Having another 100 stalls and having another 50 grooms' quarters helps us control our destiny by having more horses here on our property.

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When we put those estimates together on the prices last fall, we didn't have formal bids. It all happened too quick. And I'll tell you I missed on the bids. So I have had time now to get it bid out properly. We've had three or four bids on the barn and three bids on the dorm. It came in higher than we expected so we're back to ask for approval for the new number.

2.2

The new number on the paperwork here probably three weeks ago when I submitted it was 7.2 million. We have chiseled that down to about 6.6 million right now. So as we continue to work on pricing on it, it is coming down. And they are Indiana contractors that we'll be using to do those projects.

I was surprised on one of the major barn builders in the country, Morton Barns, they said, yeah, we'll bid. We can't start until next October. You just wouldn't think there is that kind of demand out there on it right now, but we have run this through our RCFAC committee, which is the racetrack managers and the horsemen. And it was unanimously approved that everybody thought, even with the higher numbers, we still need to do those projects. So we ask for a new approval

there.

At Hoosier, we're building, well, it's not building a new barn. We're putting new stalls in a barn, Barn 4. Those stalls, they were down in Ocala, Florida. Couldn't get roll-offs, couldn't find shipping. We finally had to rent a crane to come and load them onto flatbeds to get them up there. They are here. And they are going in right now. And roughly 14, 15 of them are already framed in, and we're getting that barn ready for our opening here on May 26.

That project we had asked for 250,000. It was approved, resubmitted that at 320. I didn't know that there wasn't LED lighting in the barn so we've gone, and we are going to add LED lighting. That's an additional 13,000. And as I said, the shipping came in quite a bit higher. Lumber has gone up. That came in higher. We didn't have canopies for the manure bins so we had to add those. Requesting 320 for that project. Right now it looks like it's going to come in around 305, 307,000.

On our surveillance project, we had gotten

1.5 million approved for that. We have started
that project. We're in there doing the front end
work, running the electric, running the fiber.

That project looks like it will come in for around 1.2, 1.3 million so that will come in a couple hundred thousand more than what was approved.

All of these projects, we'll spend what it costs. So if it comes in less, that money just stays in the fund. We're doing it transparent. Everything is documented. And it is part of our Caesars audit process. So there's at least bids on everything and then an audit process that clears through our track property GMs and accounting on the transparency of it.

On the other projects we had at Hoosier, I go back to on that surveillance system. This is the first in North America for harness racing. We will be the only harness track in North America with a hundred percent barn area surveillance. Every stall will be under a surveillance camera with a DVD, a best in class, a first in our industry, and we think comparative to the integrity of racing as we go forward with that.

A garbage truck is in the process of pricing. That price will be 130. A spreader truck for our track material, that's we're out for bids there at 125,000. That price will be good. The new dorm floors, the price will be good. The light poles,

that price will be good. We'll be starting that in the next couple of weeks. Then the two areas we're fixing up in the paddock, the judges' office and the lounge that the horsemen can use down there, that price will be good also.

So we're well under way. Took us a little longer than I thought to get going. We've learned the process from the Caesars side and the permitting side. And we ask for new approval for the barn dorm room and the barn stalls.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Out of the \$25 million, how much are we going to be spending out of it?

JOE MORRIS: We'll be in year one 6.6.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Close to eight.

JOE MORRIS: Yeah, roughly 7 million here at Indiana Grand and two and a half to 3 million at Hoosier. The way that committee worked, we set aside 11 million for each track where only that track decides, obviously, with your approvals. And then the other 3 million will go back to the committee. By the end of this month, we will have a two-year plan done for both tracks. And we'll present that to Deena and staff for your consideration at your next meeting.

CHAIRMAN BORST: We're spending about

1 10 million out of the 25 million roughly? JOE MORRIS: Yes, in year one and then it --2. 3 CHAIRMAN BORST: You have nine more years to 4 go. 5 JOE MORRIS: Yeah, I understand. CHAIRMAN BORST: You don't have much left. 6 JOE MORRIS: But they're big difference 7 You know, the extra horses here and the 8 9 dorms, we don't have enough dorms right now for the 10 number of stalls that we have. That will help 11 correct that. The integrity of racing, there's 12 nothing higher than that. This really sets Hoosier 13 apart from all of the competition with our goal at 14 Hoosier, number one harness track in North America. 15 We made some great grounds on that last year. And 16 when we get the MBNA Challenge for the Quarter 17 Horses, that's a world class event also for here. That will come in 2022. We'll need those stalls 18 19 when we have an event like that. 20 CHAIRMAN BORST: One more question. I should 21 know the answer to this, but I'm just having 2.2 trouble with it. It's been a while since I've done 23 high finances. But on your budget, there's 24 capitalized interest of 66,583. I'm having trouble 25 figuring out why we would need capitalized interest

if we're taking it out of --1 JOE MORRIS: I'd have to look. It shouldn't 2. 3 be there. This is being funded into a trust account so to speak. It will be coming out of 4 5 there. CHAIRMAN BORST: I was going to say. It's in 6 there three different times. I thought that 7 doesn't make sense. 8 9 JOE MORRIS: Should not be there. 10 CHAIRMAN BORST: We don't need to borrow from 11 it. We're going to take from it. Somebody might 12 take a look. That doesn't lower it much, but hey. 13 JOE MORRIS: That will help. 14 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any other Commission Member 15 questions? That's a lot to digest. Seeing none, 16 we're going to have to vote so we can approve the increased expenditures. So I guess we're ready for 17 a motion and second. 18 19 COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move approval.
