We also shared the list of readoptions with the horsemen's associations and Caesars just for informational purposes.

At this time Commission Staff respectfully requests the Commission's approval for these rules to be readopted without change before the end of the year.

I mean, there's a number of different things.

MS. PITMAN: There's a number of things that fall under that. It's \$100 fine so it's not necessarily a huge issue, but it's just not conducting their business in the way it needed to be conducted.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. All right. Any other questions on the commission rulings?

No. 3 on the agenda, consideration of

Indiana Grand's request for live racing dates for

2022. Noah, do you want to take that one too?

1 Thank you. Commissioners, MR. JACKSON: pursuant to the IHRC's administrative rules and 2 3 Indiana statute, the Commission must approve racing 4 dates for the permit holder before live racing can 5 be held for the upcoming year. Following the Commission's requirement that the permit holder 6 submit an annual operation plan to detail the 7 upcoming race season, it has been the practice to 8 9 consider the dates at the time the operation plan 10 is considered. 11 However, this year Caesars has been able to 12 nail down the race calendars at both racetracks. 13 You have before you on agenda item 3 the Indiana 14 Grand live racing date schedule for 2022. 15 reviewed the schedule, Commission Staff 16 respectfully recommends approval of the 2022 racing calendar. 17 CHAIRMAN BORST: Do we have a motion and a 18 19 second? 20 COMMISSIONER McCARTY: I move. 21 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Second. 2.2 Been moved and seconded. CHAIRMAN BORST: Go ahead. You can explain.

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MR. HALSTROM: Okay. I'll just give you a brief overview, Chairman Borst, members of the Commission. I would really term this -- the 2022 proposal you see there is kind of a collaboration of ideas from the different groups, the HBPA and the QHRAI and even Commission Staff. You know, it's a long meet, so we've seen plenty of ups, we've seen some challenges too, and we wanted to throw some things in there next year that may smooth out a few of those things.

We're asking for 127 days, which is more than this year. That being said, you know, we'd come into the 2021 dates not sure where we were pandemic-wise and we thought we went with 120 made the most sense. Things have been good. I mean, our business has been good and we've got some ideas to make next year even stronger. So I think I stand up here as a representative of the group and the team over at Indiana Grand with the horsemen saying we're excited about next year. Think we've found something that works for everybody who's got a stake over there.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Thank you for working on that too.

MS. PITMAN: Can I ask a question of Eric?

CHAIRMAN BORST: Sure, you can.

MS. PITMAN: Eric, can you talk to us about the -- this race meet and the races that took place that you had trouble filling?

MR. HALSTROM: Sure. Because, you know,
Ms. Pitman's got a point that, you know, we're
definitely going to be dealing with. I guess I
think the realistic point right now is we've got
challenges finding horses, there's no doubt, and
everybody who is in my position and Mr. Elmore's
position around the country's got the same issues
but, you know, we're dealing with it with the
program that's really going up and now we're having
struggles trying to find, you know, certain horses,
especially on the open side.

I'm going to take the positive view here a little bit and say this year was a little bit different also, and the one thing -- there was two things that happened really that made -- I think were very much a factor in some of the especially the mid-season struggles trying to fill some of these open races.

One of them was -- and I thought this was going to be the exact opposite -- I thought this

was going to be a good thing for us -- was
Churchill actually they vacated their -- the
racetrack. They redid their turf course over the
summer after the summer meet was over, and I
thought that would be a good thing. No turf at
Churchill and we'd pick up a bunch of horses, and
to a small extent we did. The problem was they all
wanted to come our way. You know, we had -- if we
had 500 more stalls, we could have put 500 horses
in there. We didn't have 500 stalls. They all
went out east, and so basically we lost about 800
to a thousand horses in the region to racetracks
out east that normally wouldn't have had that.

Now, they won't be doing that next year, but it's still going to be a fight for those horses. Just because they're in Louisville does not mean they're coming to Shelbyville every day. We realize that. However, it was a struggle that we didn't, you know, didn't really forecast being something that we were going to run into.

And, you know, the other positive I would say is by the time we open up next year we're going to have 105 more stalls. We've got a barn that's going up, and just as recently as yesterday

Mr. Elmore and couple others and I were talking

about making sure we have the right people in those stalls for both breeds that, you know, are there to participate and whatnot.

But, you know, the foal population for the last couple decades has gone -- has been going like this, been declining, and we're starting to feel some of that reality of how those things are changing. And it's not getting any better. The forecast for this year is quite bleak as far as, you know, the national foal population.

So we're coming up with different ways. This year kind of hit us between the eyes with some real struggles, as Ms. Pitman said. And, you know, I appreciate the horsemen working with us. We're good partners. Our racing director, Chris Polzin, I think has done -- worked as hard as he could to try and make things happen. Next year we'll try to build on some of this stuff. Make sure those stalls are filled with horses who are here to support Indiana racing. That's for sure.

MS. PITMAN: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any other questions for Mr. Halstrom?

MR. JACKSON: I had quick question as well.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Yes, Noah.

MR. JACKSON: The one-week break is new. Can you just describe for the Commission what you think the advantages of that break are?

MR. HALSTROM: Yes. Mr. Jackson, I appreciate you bringing that up. I should have said that.

I talked about a collaborative effort. One of the things from our end, when you've got a long meet of 120-some days -- and I know Rick's rolling his eyes over there with a longer meet -- but it's you almost take it in sections. It starts out and you go from spring to summer to late fall. We found that somewhere in the middle we thought it would be a good idea to just take a little break and reassess and figure out where we're at.

There's other racetracks who've had good success with this, and they run long meets too. Entries are good before the break. They're good when you come out after the break.

And the other thing it gives us a chance if we need to do some work on our racetrack, you know, after -- we're open year-round now. We don't get a whole lot of time to do a lot of hard work on that racetrack. So it will give us that time. Gives the turf course a week to just water it and get it back into fresh shape there.

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          We'll see what happens. You know, if it
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     doesn't turn out to be something we thought, next

Next on the agenda is consideration of Harrah's Hoosier Park's request for live racing dates for 2022. Mr. Moore.

MR. MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Rick Moore, vice president and general manager of racing here at Harrah's Hoosier Park. I guess the word of the day is collaboration, and collaboration was definitely a result here of our meetings with the Indiana Standardbred Association and us here at Harrah's Hoosier Park and come together collectively to present a racing calendar that we think, like Eric says, makes sense for all parties. This will be the longest stretch of the calendar that we've ever raced standardbred racing or any racing here in Indiana next year. We're going from the end of March, March 25, till basically almost the middle of December, December 10.

Some of the nuances I will point out on the calendar. We have traded out Sundays for Tuesdays. We will not be racing the night before Thanksgiving or Thanksgiving Day. We will be racing on the spring/summer holidays, like Memorial Day,

Fourth of July, Labor Day, trying to generate attendance here on track. Make those big celebration days, days when people aren't working, can come out, enjoy racing here at Hoosier Park.

One other comment I would point out, as I put in my letter. Whichever day at the State Fair becomes the grand circle day -- and we think it's either going to be August 10 or 17 -- we'll be dark that day and move that day to Tuesday, October 4. So want to make sure everyone can participate down at the State Fair, which is a big day, at grand circle day.

So I think I pointed out the different aspects of the calendar that you might find, you know, little bit different. So be glad to answer any questions that anyone may have.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions? Deena.

MS. PITMAN: Rick, did you have any problems filling your races this year?

MR. MOORE: You know, for the most part we've been really successful in the entry box. And, you know, I think the calendar that we laid out has made sense, the five-day weeks. Our challenge at any racetrack in the country, most tracks have gone back to four days a week, but we're lucky on a

portion of our calendar where we have five days a week is when the two-year-olds start racing, sire stakes. So we've really been fortunate that we've been able to average 13 races a day. We're at 8.4 starters per race. We've gotten a number of horses now coming from Chicago with Hawthorne being closed.

So it's really worked out well that we've been able to fill races here at Harrah's Hoosier Park and we strive to fill 14 a day and most days we can do that. And thanks to the Indiana Horse Racing Commission, on our big days, like last Friday night, we've been able to card 15 races. I would point out it was a great Hoosier champions night the other night, which was maybe our biggest or second biggest handle night ever for our Hoosier champions at \$1.1 million.

So to answer your question, Deena, we've really been fortunate in the way we've been able to fill races here this summer -- spring, summer, and fall.

Ιf you'd like to comment.

Jessica can explain it all 17 to us. Good morning. When we look at 18 MS. BARNES: 19 our breed development program's rules, when we put 20 rules into place, we always try to think of all the 21 possible scenarios. And as time goes by, there's 2.2 inevitably something that we don't think about and 23 unintended consequences. 24 So we received two separate requests earlier 25 this year of stallions that were failed to be

registered in time and one was from 2019 breeding season and one was from 2021. I spoke with the executive director about that request because it would require a rule waiver in order to register those stallions. She recommended that we also bring it up to the Thoroughbred Breed Development Advisory Committee and get their recommendation on how we probably should proceed with it.

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They wanted to proceed with requesting a rule waiver and also look at the existing rule to make a modification for the future. They felt like the existing rule, specifically the language that doesn't allow a stallion to be registered late after it has already covered mares, does cause an undue burden to mare owners who have no liability in the registration of that stallion. So it is the stallion owner's responsibility to register that stallion, and if the stallion was not registered with the Commission, the mare — owner of the mare is inevitably harmed when they don't realize that the stallion wasn't registered.

So we had in both of these cases several mare owners who had bred their mares to stallions thinking that they were registered with the Indiana

program and only to find out after the fact that it was not. So the committee felt that, especially when we're looking at our program and the number of mares that have been declining over the years, the actions that we have taken -- I don't know if you remember, but we put some things in place for the thoroughbred program to try to attract additional mares and we are even providing incentives for new mares to come to Indiana -- that, you know, denying these registrations and losing almost 12 foals is a lot of foals for our program that that was kind of a hardship for the program.

And so we are requesting a waiver, specifically it's 71 IAC 13.5-2-3(b), to allow the two stallions in question to be registered. And then the committee will actually be coming back with you later on this year with the request to change the rules so this type of thing doesn't happen in the future.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Just a question. To prevent it from happening, wouldn't there be a way that the owner of the mare could find out whether the stallion's registered? Or couldn't they provide -- owner of the stallion provide certification? That would solve it quicker.

MS. BARNES: Yeah, we do have lists on our website that we post. Unfortunately if somebody is new to our program, they don't always know to go look for those things. So, you know, we are always trying to figure out ways how to continually educate people.

You know, and one of the things that happens is when our inspector is out in the field, they are inspecting stallions and sometimes they will catch this, but unfortunately the way that the rule is written, by that time a stallion has already covered a mare. So that specific language in the rule really poses a problem that we didn't think about. You know, ideally want the stallion owner to -- we wanted to be like get it in before you ever cover any mares but we're finding that that didn't happen.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Maybe there is a way that the stallion owner would have to show the owner of the mare the certification. Just automatically make that a rule that you got to do it, and then that way you don't have to worry about it anymore in the future. Just have to think of something creative. More collaboration.

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update regarding winter training at Harrah's

Hoosier Park and a construction update on

Indiana Grand's new dormitory and barn. I think
that's Mr. Joe Morris.

MR. MORRIS: Good morning, Commissioners.

Joe Morris from Caesars Entertainment. I'll start with Indiana Grand on the construction update. We were originally scheduled to have this barn and dorm in service by the end of this year. Ran into some assortment of different snags, the biggest of which was trying to get our permits through IDEM. We have worked through that at this point, but we have about a three and a half-month delay now in those projects. So they won't be done the end, they'll be done the beginning of March. So they'll go into service for our next year's racing season, and that'll work out fine for us.

I do want to point out one particular week.

It's the week of Thanksgiving -- and I think it's going to be Tuesday -- we're going to have an old-fashioned barn raising that day. And they still build even the new barns with the sides laid down, you raise them up with people pushing them up and with cranes and the roof with that, and we'll have coffee and hot cider and make it a barn area

event. We'd like to invite any of you who would like to come to that. Lot of history to a barn raising.

2.2

So we'll have that. The dorm will be depleted in January, so that'll be ready to go.

Couple other projects we have there is LED lighting. We have 420 stalls that are winterized there and we'll be adding LED lighting to those barns. And we also have a drainage challenge that we need to correct out in the barn area and we'll do that this fall also.

At Hoosier this will be our first year of winter training. We formed a committee, which is three of us from the track side and four from the -- four horsemen from the ISA side. We are expecting about 275 horses for the first year of winter training. We'll have 300 stalls winterized.

Little easier, we just copy the rules we had at Indiana Grand. Worked well last year, so there's no sense in reinventing the wheel there. They had to have been stabled on our back stretch this last summer to be eligible and we -- as I said, looks like we'll have about 275 horse in there. And same measurement of the success or failure is our entry box on the first weekend in

March. If we can fill that box up more, it was well worth the expense of doing it, and if not, you know, it probably wasn't. But I'm expecting it should help, as it did at Indiana Grand.

2.

I do want to tell we are working on our 2022 racing ops plan. The 2021 was a heck of a good road map for us, and we will be building on that. Hoosier Park this year will have the highest history -- highest handle in its history. It'll be the first time ever the handle has gone over \$100 million. And a lot of that is following that road map that we all worked together on for 2021.

We've now had nine days over a million dollars in handle. Previous record was five and two of those were Breeders Crown. Last Friday -- I've just done the two meets -- was the biggest crowd I have ever seen here and a record handle for super night. We bet over \$50,000 three different times with on-track handle. So all good things to build on here for next year.

Down at Indiana Grand it'll be the first time we have ever gone past the \$200 million mark in handle. So another very good successful program, again, laid out in that 2021 ops plan that we'll build on for 2022. In the quarter horse racing the

previous high there was \$3 million, and on our six days we've done \$4.9 million for the horse handle.

Two days over a million, and those were the first times that's ever happened.

So we've got some good momentum going. We're working on the 2022 plan. We do have our agreements done also with our three horsemen's groups. They've been voted. They're not all signed yet, but the agreements will be a part of that package we put forth to you in December also. You know, we couldn't do these numbers without the participation of our horsemen. They are giving us a product that we need. And to build handle the first thing you have to have is good product, and we have good product at both places.

So real quick update there. Things are headed in the right direction and we look forward to adding to it for 2022.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any questions? Deena, have a question?

MS. PITMAN: Joe, do you want to go ahead and go through the quarterly report, the third quarter report real, quickly?

MR. MORRIS: That would be great. We've just presented, we're passing our third quarter

charitable giving report, and we'll have Christal come up and do that report for us.

MS. JOHNSON: Good morning. Christal Johnson, community relations manager here at Hoosier Park. Hi there. I am so incredibly excited to share with you all, as I was the last time, very first time few months ago, about our efforts here at Harrah's Hoosier Park.

Quarter three end specifically we have partnered with Operation: Job Ready Vets. It really takes a holistic approach not only to the vet but their families and future employers and I think that's really important where we are right now in our society, and so we're excited about that.

We've also donated to First Choice for Women, and they have been in communication -- or in operation -- I'm sorry -- for about twenty-seven years but it's new to Anderson. And so to be a part of as their grass roots effort is pretty big for us.

As well as our \$10,000 donation to Standardbred Transition Alliance, we're excited about that. As well as \$5,000 contribution to Agape Therapeutic Riding, and what they do is

provide resources to those that are both physically and mentally handicap and as opposed -- as a part of their therapy. So that's that.

But I'm as equally excited -- and a lot of those dollars are great and all of that. What I do know is that our first charity starts at home. And so we have been in a place where we've been able to come alongside some of our team members that are struggling with suicide in their families,

Alzheimer's in their families, as well as ALS, and so we have been able to not only participate in the walks and be sponsors and that sort of thing but, again, provide a resource to some of our team members to create a better morale, if you will, and just support system here on the property.

So we're excited about those things that we're doing. Any questions about quarter three for Harrah's Hoosier Park? Chairman?

CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions? Keep being excited.

MS. JOHNSON: Yeah, I love it. I love it. I also have the pleasure of sharing a few things from Indiana Grand, but before I do that.

One of the things that we've really committed to is being a good player in our community, having

a presence. And as I reach out to people, I tell them I don't want to make a transaction, I want to create relationships, and we are seeing the benefit of that coming back full forward. Anderson and Madison County as a whole, our dollars are trending on target based upon what you all asked us to do and right now we are at 72 percent in Madison County and Anderson, and that's pretty exciting for us.

The other thing that's exciting is that we are about 12 percent for equine donations as well as 16 percent for other, and what I mean by other is things that are outside of Anderson and Madison County, so we partner in Indianapolis and some north region. But for us to have such great numbers here in Madison County and Anderson is really huge and our community is really in a place where they're receiving it.

Okay. Now on to Indiana Grand. Their quarter three highlights is that they are continuing their dedication and support to the Friends of Ferdinand in the amount of \$6,000 was celebrated during the Indiana Derby back in July.

Indiana Grand team members and jockeys and horsemen and racing fans came together on Thursday,

July 29, to celebrate and support the national weekend for PDJF Racing Across America and their Back to School efforts.

Indiana Grand also made a \$100,000 commitment to the improvement of the Shelby County Fairgrounds over the course of 2021. The second installment of their donation of \$50,000 was presented to the Fairgrounds board back in September.

So they are doing exactly what we all -- you all have asked them to do as well. As they look at Shelby County and Shelbyville, their donation right now is about 41 percent, their equine donation is at 37 percent, and their other donations are at 22 percent. So we're doing exactly and I think we are as equally excited about it.

Any questions for Indiana Grand?

CHAIRMAN BORST: Questions?

MS. JOHNSON: No? Thank you all so much.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. No vote on that.

Next on our agenda I guess is an update, consideration of the advance deposit wagering allocation request from the Indiana Standardbred Association. I think we're just going to get an update I think here today.

MR. PUTNAM: Good morning. Joe Putnam,

- 1 president of the Indiana Standardbred Association.
- 2 | We've had some meetings with the Commission about
- 3 our portion of the ADW. In the past we've
- 4 | dedicated this money to the general purse account.
- 5 | So going forward we're asking for your
- 6 | consideration of using that money for Indiana sired
- 7 only events. Very similar to what we do with
- 8 Indiana breed development money. You know, we
- 9 | think that will continue to support and let the
- 10 | trend grow of the Indiana sired program.
- 11 I can answer any questions.

(No response.) 7 CHAIRMAN BORST: We have some new business? 8 MR. JACKSON: Yes. This is sort of a 9 10 last-minute addition, but we wanted to get it out 11 there because it does include a change to the 12 budget approved as part of the ISA's application 13 for 2021 as a horsemen's association. 14 ISA is looking to hire an executive director, 15 which they have provided the reasons why they're 16 interested in doing that as part of their plan, but 17 essentially it allows ISA to communicate as sort of one voice and allows them to have those 18 19 communications not only with Caesars but with the 20 Commission and outside the industry. 21 So what we wanted to bring up here as new 2.2 business is simply that ISA is looking to make a 23 hire. I think, Joe, sooner rather than later on 24 that?

We'd like permission to at least

go -- probably not going to hire till 2022 also, but we'd like to, you know, have approval now where we can advertise for that position.

MR. JACKSON: So what we'd like to do is request the Commission's approval to make a slight modification to the 2021 ISA budget should they make a hire prior to 2022. Because if they -- the 2022 budget will be brought before the Commission at the December meeting, but should they choose a candidate prior to that they have provided the Commission with an updated 2021 budget which reflects some money moved around to pay for the salary of that individual for the rest of this year.

So given that it's just a slight modification to the budget that was approved last December, I just wanted to bring it before the Commission and ask for an approval there just so ISA can begin moving forward with this process.

CHAIRMAN BORST: So the approval we need to state for the rest of 2021 for the budget is a technical change more than anything else?

MR. JACKSON: Yes. The budget itself was modified to allow for the salary of this individual for the last few months of the year. Based on what
