Final Determination Findings and Conclusions Lake County

The Indiana Board of Tax Review (the Board) issues this determination in the above matter, and finds and concludes as follows:

Procedural History

- 1. The informal hearing as described in Ind. Code § 6-1.1-4-33 was held. The Department of Local Government Finance (the DLGF) determined that the tax assessment for the subject property is \$1,300 and notified the Petitioner on March 31, 2004.
- 2. The Petitioner filed a Form 139L on April 27, 2004.
- 3. The Board issued a notice of hearing to the parties dated October 4, 2004.
- 4. Special Master Kathy J. Clark held the hearing in Crown Point on November 9, 2004.

Facts

- 5. The subject property is located at 2103 New York Avenue rear in Whiting.
- 6. The subject property is a vacant platted lot measuring 25 feet by 25 feet.
- 7. The Special Master did not conduct an on-site visit of the property.
- 8. The assessed value of the property (land only) as determined by the DLGF is \$1,300.
- 9. The assessed value requested by Petitioner is \$0.
- 10. Persons sworn as witnesses at the hearing: Arvine Plemons, owner,

James Hemming, assessor/auditor.

Issue

- 11. Petitioner contends that, due to the location of the lot, it is of no use to anyone other than Petitioner and it could not be sold. *Plemons testimony*.
- 12. Summary of Respondent's contentions in support of the assessment:
 - a) It is being priced as a rear lot because of its location and is receiving no other influence factor. *Respondent Exhibits 2, 3; Hemming testimony.*
 - b) The lot would be beneficial to Petitioner or to the adjacent property owners. *Hemming testimony*.

d) These Findings and Conclusions.

Analysis

- 15. The most applicable cases are:
 - a) A Petitioner seeking review of a determination of an assessing official has the burden to establish a prima facie case proving that the current assessment is incorrect and specifically what the correct assessment would be. See Meridian Towers East & West v. Washington Twp. Assessor, 805 N.E.2d 475, 478 (Ind. Tax Ct. 2003); see also, Clark v. State Bd. of Tax Comm'rs, 694 N.E.2d 1230 (Ind. Tax Ct. 1998).
 - b) In making its case, the taxpayer must explain how each piece of evidence is relevant to the requested assessment. *See Indianapolis Racquet Club, Inc. v. Washington Twp. Assessor*, 802 N.E.2d 1018, 1022 (Ind. Tax Ct. 2004) ("[I]t is the taxpayer's duty to walk the Indiana Board . . . through every element of the analysis").

- c) The Petitioner must submit 'probative evidence' that adequately demonstrates the alleged error. Mere allegations, unsupported by factual evidence, are not sufficient to establish an alleged error. Whitley Products, Inc. v. State Bd. of Tax Comm'rs, 704 N.E.2d 1113, 1119 (Ind. Tax Ct. 1998); Herb v. State Bd. of Tax Comm'rs, 656 N.E.2d 1230 (Ind. Tax Ct. 1998).
- d) Once the Petitioner establishes a prima facie case, the burden shifts to the assessing official to rebut the Petitioner's evidence. *See American United Life Ins. Co. v. Maley*, 803 N.E.2d 276 (Ind. Tax Ct. 2004). The assessing official must offer evidence that impeaches or rebuts the Petitioner's evidence. *Id.; Meridian Towers*, 805 N.E.2d at 479.
- 16. Petitioner did not provide sufficient evidence to support the Petitioner's contention. This conclusion was arrived at because:
 - a) Petitioner presented no probative evidence. The conclusion that "due to its location the lot is worthless to anyone but me" is unsupported by factual evidence. Mere allegations will not be considered sufficient to establish an alleged error in the eyes of the Board. *Whitley Products*, 704 N.E.2d at 1119.
 - b) Where the Petitioner has not supported the claim with probative evidence, Respondent's duty to support the assessment with substantial evidence is not triggered. *Lacy Diversified Indus. v. Dep't of Gov't Fin.*, 799 N.E.2d 1215, 1221-1222 (Ind. Tax Ct. 2003).
 - c) Petitioner failed to introduce probative evidence for a change in assessment.

Conclusion

17. Petitioner failed to make a prima facie case. The Board finds in favor of Respondent.

Final Determination

In accordance with the above findings and conclusions the Indiana Board of Tax Review now determines that the total assessment should not be changed.
