

Indiana State Library

The Indiana State Library has served the citizens of Indiana since 1825. A few steps away from the Indiana Statehouse, the State Library is open to the public for a variety of needs including but not limited to: Genealogy, Indiana history, Preservation, Rare Books & Manuscripts, Reference & Government services, a Talking Books & Braille library, as well as the State Data Center. It also serves as a free facility for meetings and special events available to state agencies, nonprofits and the community (some fees apply to non-agency events).

The magnificent limestone building housing the Indiana State Library and the Indiana Historical Bureau was dedicated in 1934. Within the building are beautiful stained glass windows, colorful murals, walnut-paneled walls, brass accents, and wood carvings. The building is a showcase in itself, an incredible example of early 1930s American architecture constructed with Indiana limestone, sandstone, and walnut.

Tours are available to the public Monday through Friday and include an Architecture Tour, "Pursuit of Pride" Children's Tour, and a Researcher's Tour. Each tour is customized to fit your schedule and interests. Please call the library to schedule group or individual tours.

Librarians collect and preserve all types of information, data, and materials about the state of Indiana. The library's professional staff is available to assist with research questions, offer expertise on a variety of subject matters, and provide general guidance and information about materials in the library's collections.



What's new in 2014?

There have been a lot of exciting developments at the Indiana State Library in 2014. One of those developments was the creation of a preservation lab on the fourth floor of the building.

The mission of Indiana State Library preservation lab is to improve and ensure long-term, ongoing access to the collections of the Indiana State Library. The department, staffed by one full-time Conservator and one part-time Federal Work Study Program student, fulfills this primary goal by providing conservation treatments of collections items and implementing preventive care and administrative policies. The Conservator also provides information and training to the statewide library community and, on occasion, the general public through consultations and workshops.

Conservation treatment of the Indiana State Library's collections previously took place at the Indiana State Archives. The decision to build a conservation lab on site at the ISL was driven by an increasing demand for treatment work as well as the need to have the Conservator in the library full time to allow consultation with library staff whenever needed. The Martha E. Wright Conservation Lab allows the Conservator to provide highly specialized treatments for a variety of materials, extending the life of the ISL collections so that researchers can continue to use them for generations to come. The lab also assists in facilitating digitization initiatives, as some items require conservation treatment before they can be digitized if they are torn, heavily soiled, or extremely brittle.

Coming Soon:

To celebrate Indiana's Bicentennial, the Indiana State Library is adding two new spaces. The first is the Indiana Young Readers Center which will be a room filled with collection items along with some fun, hands-on educational activities focused on Indiana Author's or about Indiana. The second space is a partnership with the Department of Administration to create an Education Center to introduce the visitors of the Government Center to what State Government does for all Hoosiers.
